Please be sure to complete your ballot and return it to the Arroyo Roble Resort prior to October 16, 2015 in order for the staff to complete the election count before the annual homeowners meeting on November 4, 2015. This year we have two candidates running for election as your Board of Directors; current Vice President of the Board – Mr. Gary Loveland and homeowner Mr. John Biggers. ### **New Phone Numbers**

The Arroyo Roble Resort has recently upgraded the telecommunication services in order to comply with the latest guest safety regulations. As a result of the changes, we now have direct phone numbers to the following resort departments for you convenience. This means that if you have an emergency (medical/fire etc.) and you call 911 during your stay from your villa telephone, the 911 dispatcher will know which villa you are calling from. ## Ramblings from Randy

#### Director of Grounds and Landscape

In my role as Director of Grounds I have had the opportunity to speak with a number of our owners; most of them long time owners. Some have seen the property annually for 30 years; needless to say things have changed.

Here are a few of the questions that I am frequently asked...

#### Q: Why have you cut down some of the trees?

A: Sightlines and insect infestation are the only reasons we would take a tree out. Some of our trees were planted over 30 years ago and have grown too large for their placement and views from decks or windows become obstructed. The original Cottonwood and Sycamore trees on the property are "self-shedding" and continually drop off limbs. There are times that we need to trim or cut these trees to ensure the safety of everyone while visiting the Arroyo Roble Resort grounds.

## Sedona Fall Hikes

# Q: Why are there not more flowers or plants around our villa?

A: We have a large population of Javelina that roam the property nightly and devour most flowers. On several occasions, we have planted flowers only to arrive the next day and they were completely eaten. The Javelina never even leave a note of thanks for the new "snacks". We have tried to replace plants with blooming plants that don't attract the Javelina. We have also planted "Society Garlic" which omits an odor that repels Javelina. On the rare occasion when the Javelina are not active, we always have the joy of having many skunks enjoying the plants and seeds as well. These wonderful creatures are always best enjoyed from a distance while they eat the flowers and plants. Digging on the resort grounds to add new planter beds is a challenge as well because the majority of the trees on the grounds have very shallow root systems which makes it a difficult process to dig in many areas of the property.

#### Q: What is that noise??

A: The Grand Western Cicada or sometimes called the Bush Cicada is what you may be hearing. Annually the larva of this noisy bug feeds on the sap in the roots of trees until it becomes an adult then it comes out of the ground climbs a tree and starts its love call. That buzzing that drives us crazy is actually "all the rage" if you're a female cicada. The adults actually don't feed; they just are looking for love. They emerge and make that sound you hear. It is their mating call. Their above ground life span is about 4 to 6 weeks, during that time they mate and lay their eggs before they die. Then the cycle begins again. The name Cicada is Latin for "tree cricket". And our bush cicadas are considered to be harbingers of the monsoon season here in Sedona. That's probably because they sense the increasing levels of moisture and crawl up out of the ground for their brief season of making cicada whoopee.

The large Cottonwood and Sycamore trees that shade the property and keep the creek side area cool are native to the Sedona area. There are a number of different fruit and nut trees that provide food for the squirrels, skunks and javelina and of course the black birds and the large variety of birds including cranes and eagles. We have even seen otter in the creek. In summary, our task in the grounds department is to maintain the property as naturally as possible. This task provides for a unique experience for all our guests on the Arroyo Roble Resort grounds, both human and animal. We strive to accentuate the natural beauty of our surroundings while maintaining ease of access and beauty for all to enjoy.

There is something special about Arroyo Roble. I have learned this in my five years here, but most of our owners have known this all along. Come and enjoy!

#### TRAIL NAME: MYSTIC TRAIL DRIVING DISTANCE ONE WAY: 3.15 Miles (Time 10 minutes)

ACCESS ROAD: All vehicles, all paved

HIKING DISTANCE ONE WAY: 1 miles (Time 30 minutes)

How STRENUOUS: Easy

FEATURES: Views, easy to reach, all weather

**NUTSHELL:** This trail, new to the Sedona trail system in 1998, takes you from the road to the Chapel of the Holy Cross to the Sedona Cemetary.

**DIRECTIONS:** From the Y in Sedona go south on Highway 179 (toward Phoenix) for a distance of 2.8 miles to Chapel Drive, which is the road to the world famous Chapel of the Holy Cross, one of the most important cultural landmarks of Sedona. Turn left (E) onto Chapel Drive and follow it until you are just east of Antelope Drive, the 3.15 mile point, where you will see the trailhead to your left (N), at a gate in the fence. Park along the shoulder.

#### TRAILHEAD: At gate.

**DESCRIPTION:** This path is part of the Bell Rock Pathway project, sponsored by the Sedona Kiwanis Club. Our thanks to Kiwanis for its participation in this worthwhile enterprise.

This trail starts at the base of Twin Buttes, a lovely redrock formation, one of the largest buttes south of Sedona. The Chapel of the Holy Cross is built on the south face of this butte "around the corner" from the trailhead. (The Chapel is only 0.5 miles from the trailhead-worth a side trip). We enjoy looking at the sheer cliffs of the buttes at the start of the hike, with a deep red base, with lighter colored cliffs and spires at the upper levels.

This trail is much used by mountain bikers, so keep an eye out for them as you hike. From the markers encountered along the way, it seems that this trail follows a natural gas pipeline easement.

From the starting point, the trail heads north, hugging the base of Twin Buttes. There are no major elevation changes, and the trail feels almost level, though it does slope downward from the south to the north end. As you hike, you soon emerge from a screen of trees and see many homes as well as Highway 179. Airport Mesa is to your left (W). This is not a trail for someone seeking a wilderness experience, but it is just the ticket for someone who wants a nice little walk near town.

At the halfway point you come around the buttes to a point where you can see into Sedona and enjoy pleasant views to the north. Then you move more noticeable downhill, toward Battlement Mesa, finally ending at the north end of the trail, at a cul-de-sac in a little subdivision adjacent to the Sedona Cemetary.

### HIKING TIPS:

- ▲ Bring 2 liters of Water (minimum)
- ▲ Wear hiking shoes/boots (grippy outsole)
- Tell someone when/where you will be hiking
- ▲ Sun Protection/Sun Screen
- Hiking Stick or Trekking Poles
